COMMUNITY

Tom C. Clark High School, one of the twelve comprehensive high schools in the Northside Independent School District, opened and dedicated in 1978. It is a comprehensive high school located in a suburban residential area in the northwest part of San Antonio, Texas. The school borders a University, a medical complex, corporate businesses, and the Texas Hill Country. Northside ISD is a diverse, rapidly growing district with a population of more than 100,000 students.

SPECIAL ACHIEVEMENT

Clark students have achieved excellent records in many extracurricular and co-curricular activities, including athletics, band, speech, drama, pep squad, languages, math, science, and literary competitions. Consistent winners in most sports, Clark teams hold state titles in swimming, diving, volleyball, water polo and track. Clark music groups have received national recognition from music educators, and Clark students have consistently earned state honors in all UIL literary and fine arts events.

MARKING SYSTEM

All grades are recorded numerically. Transfer grades are recorded using the numerical equivalent on the grade scale of the sending school.

Students will be awarded credits on a one-half, one credit, or two or more credits basis, whichever is applicable. The awarding of credit affirms that a student has satisfactorily met the state and local requirements.

WEIGHTED COURSES

Clark weights Honors and Advanced courses by adding (5) points to the semester grade. AP courses are weighted (8) points per semester grade for the purpose of class rank and GPA only.

The computation of weighted grades is done at the completion of the course. Weighted grades are used in computing grade average and rank in class, but numerical grades on the transcript do not show the added or subtracted points.

CLASS RANK AND G.P.A.

A student's Grade Point Average (GPA) determines class rank. Grade Point Average is the average of all semester grades awarded credit by the State of Texas. Although correspondence courses are not computed in the GPA. Official class rank and GPA are recorded on the Student's Academic Achievement Record (AAR) at the end of the sixth semester and then again, at the end of the seventh semester which holds as the final GPA and class rank for graduation.

CURRICULUM

Students are offered courses to meet their individual needs and interests. All core subject classes are offered on various levels: Honors, Advanced, Advanced Placement (AP), Dual credit and Academic.

The advanced placement courses offered are Calculus AB and BC, Statistics, Biology II, Physics B and C, Environmental Science, English Literature and Language, World History, U.S. History, Government, Micro Economics, Psychology, Sociology, European History, Art History Spanish Language and Literature, French Language and Literature, German Language and Literature, Latin and Literature and Computer Science.

Our Dual credit program is offered through Northwest Vista College. The courses available are English, College Algebra, Pre-Calculus, Statistics, Calculus AB and BC, Biology, U.S History, U.S Government, Spanish III, Welding, Medical Terminology and Anatomy and Physiology.

Our comprehensive special education programs include resource classes, lab classes with an academic and a special education teacher; vocational training for the educationally handicapped, including office skills and food; and on-the-job training.

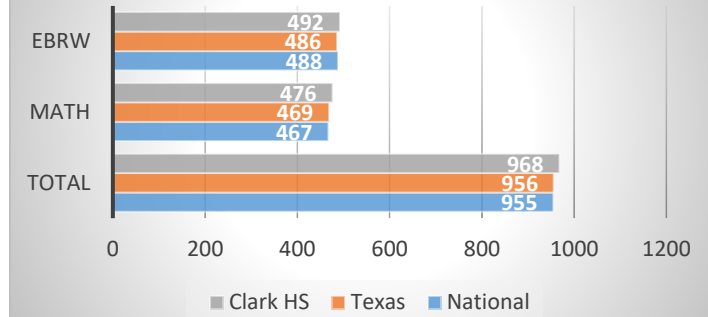

ENDORSEMENTS

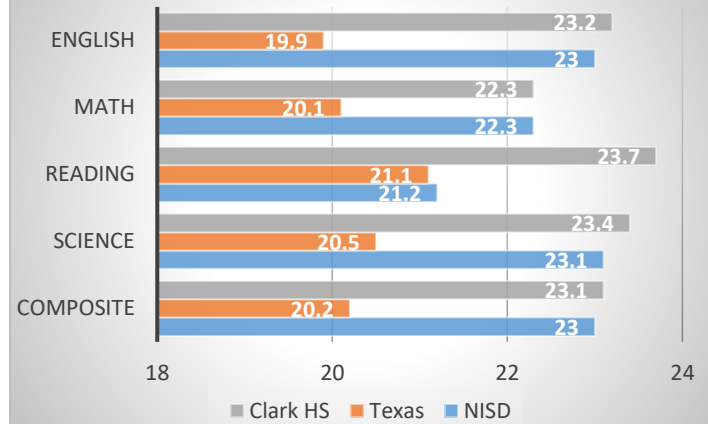
